Support for **Universal Credit** claimants

The multi-agency 'welfare reform working together group' is urging Universal Credit claimants not to miss out on important entitlements: to Free School Meals, Healthy Start Vouchers and support with their Council Tax.

Universal Credit Full Service (UCFS) began a phased roll out in Coventry in July and over 1,000 new claims have been made.

Many issues have arisen for claimants to overcome but the group believes there are three key entitlements which some UC

claimants are missing out on. Council Tax Support is not part of Universal Credit. UC claimants must apply for CTS separately to their UC claim. Free School Meals can be claimed if income falls below a certain amount. For details visit www.coventry.gov. uk/freeschoolmeals

Healthy Start Vouchers – which were once called 'milk tokens' but now cover a wide range of milk, fruit and vegetables - are also available to some people on Universal Credit with a low income (mainly pregnant women and those with young children). For details visit

As one of the first cities in the UK set to benefit from CityFibre and Vodafone's partnership to bring ultrafast full fibre broadband to up to a million UK homes and businesses by 2021, Coventry is already ahead of the game when it comes to digital transformation.

Speaking recently of a £60m investment, Cllr Jim O'Boyle Cabinet Member for Jobs and Regeneration, said:

The £36.7m waterpark currently under construction on the former Spire House site in the city centre will be called The Wave.

The name has been selected because it's short, memorable, descriptive and it has been taken from the design of the building. The logo features a spiral letter 'W' that brings a flavour of a twisting flume ending in a splash of water, making it an innovative <u>and modern design.</u>

Alongside The Wave with its thrill rides and slides, the building will also include a day spa, 25 metre 4 lane swimming pool, 120 station fitness suite, . squash courts and dance studio. Cllr Kamran Caan, Cabinet Member for Public Health and Sport, said:

"The Wave is the perfect name and in keeping with the design of the building, which is eye catching and memorable. No other city has this kind of facility in the heart of a city centre. All of this in time to celebrate City of Sport in 2019."

The waterpark includes a splash pad area with jets, tipping buckets and smaller accessible slides for toddlers, easy access areas for people with mobility issues and a wave pool and lazy river.

Leader of Coventry City Council, Cllr George Duggins, said:

"We have invested over £30m into The Wave - our biggest single investment in sport and activityand I think this shows our commitment to get **Coventry active.**"

Youth offer in city

A new mobile app which hosts a one-stop platform for young people in Coventry has been released.

The Coventry Youth Partnership has launched the app as part of its new website and it will provide a database of activities and events taking place in the city.

Partners from across the city have joined together to provide a calendar of activities for the platform, which has been supported by Coventry City Council.

The app is a place for young people, parents and youth workers to go to find out where they can take part in activities in their local communities.

Most of the provision listed is either free of charge or low price and targets people aged eight to 19.

It will only be accessed directly from the Coventry Youth Partnership website.

The project is also being supported by Coventry City of Culture Trust, as the city builds toward being UK City of Culture in 2021

The release of the new app and website forms part of a larger city-wide work programme led by the Positive Youth Foundation

Electric taxi scheme offer

A unique scheme is underway to encourage cab drivers to move to electric vehicles.

Coventry's "Go Electric Taxi" scheme is supported by LEVC, the Irish energy company ESB, Siemens and taxi app Gett and forms part of an ambitious programme to move towards an electrically-driven taxi fleet in the city.

The scheme includes extended test drives, a financial incentive for the first electric taxi orders, free electric charging during the trial and zero commission fares on taxi app bookings.

To ensure that drivers can benefit from the lower fuel costs of electric vehicle ownership, it was also announced that the first six of **39** rapid charge points have been installed by ESB and Siemens.

The scheme is funded by the Office of Low Emission Vehicles,



City welcomes driverless car demo

A pioneering project to trial driverless cars has been held in Coventry.

The UK Autodrive project is the largest of three projects to have emerged from the UK government's 'Introducing Driverless Cars' competition in 2015, which had the aim of establishing the UK as a global hub for the development of autonomous vehicle technologies.

The project is helping to make roads safer and less congested, air cleaner, and commutes simpler and more efficient.

The partners in the UK Autodrive consortium include Coventry City Council and Jaguar Land Rover. Cllr Jim O'Boyle, Cabinet

Member for Jobs and Regeneration, said:

"I'm pleased that once again we have been able to show what autonomous and connected cars can do in real road situations.

"With the UK Battery Industrialisation Centre, WMG, JLR and two great universities all based here we are at the very heart of innovation in this area and this work is the natural next step for a city like Coventry."

New rules on HMOs

Changes to the licensing rules for private properties described as houses in multiple occupation (HMO) have been introduced

A house or building occupied by five or more people of two or more families will be subject to licensing requirements.

It will also include the minimum size of rooms used for sleeping one and two adults in this type of accommodation.

The change of definition will affect private sector landlords.

one adult will need to be no smaller than 6.51m², while those slept in by two adults

Fuel poverty help

Citizens Advice are promoting the Warm Homes Discount which offers financial help with electricity bills.

Though automatic for some on Pension Credit, others on low ncome can apply for a £140 discount on their electricity bill; but not Il energy suppliers are signed up to the scheme.

Spotlight on modern slavery

Awareness of modern slavery and the exploitation of vulnerable people in the West Midlands has been highlighted at a roadshow in Coventry.

A campaign to put a stop to the practice of modern slavery, is being highlighted by key agencies including the Council, the NHS, and the West Midlands Anti-Slavery Network.

Slavery is the fastest growing organised-crime in the world. Many are unaware it exists in communities and businesses. There are 13,000 suspected

victims in the UK. Coventry City Council's Deputy Leader, Cllr Abdul Salam Khan, said: "We work hard in the city on issues like domestic abuse and forced marriage, and modern slavery is another hidden crime.

"There is no typical victim. Modern slavery comes in many forms, including sexual exploitation, being forced to commit crimes and working to pay off unrealistic debts."

A new footpath was completed at Caludon Park this summer.

It's one of dozens of parks that have undergone improvements to encourage people of all ages and abilities to be more physically active.

Coventry's Public Health Team has invested in park routes in 44 parks and open spaces.

Distance markers are accompanied by a map of the route in the park/open space.

Children from Wyken Croft Primary School joined other local people to try out the new path. Cabinet Member for Public Health and Sport, Cllr Kamran

Caan, said: "The scheme is about changing people's lives for the rest of their lives.

"The new park routes and park markers have enabled us to make better use of the vast amount of green space we have in the city." For details visit www.coventry. gov.uk/covonthemove ■ New cricket pitches are being created in Coventry parks and open spaces in a partnership between Coventry City Council and the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB).

A grant of over £120,000 from the ECB will see seven non-turf cricket pitches and a five lane cricket net facility developed in local parks across the city.

The pilot project is part of the build up to European City of Sport 2019, which has attracted additional funding for a community cricket co-ordinator. The pitches will be used all year round by local people. Longford Park, Hearsall Common, Stoke Heath, Charterhouse fields, Xcel Leisure Centre, Coundon Hall Park and War Memorial Park will all get non-turf wickets with plans for Edgwick Park to have a new five lane cricket net facility.



A new games area has been built for local people to take part in a range of community sports at Holbrooks Park.

The MUGA (Multi-Use Games Area) was completed at the park – refurbishing an existing basketball facility. The improvements also included a new footpath, four benches and other maintenance work.



Primary schoolchildren and volunteers have planted trees to create a community orchard in the gardens of one of Coventry's finest medieval buildings.

The Charterhouse, which is a Grade I Listed 14th century Carthusian monastery, is to be transformed by Historic Coventry Trust into a major visitor attraction ahead of Coventry being UK City of Culture in 2021.

The Coventry Charterhouse Association and Charterhouse Residents' Association selected a mix of apple, pear, plum and cherry trees for a mixed fruit orchard.


Local resident and arboriculturalist Wayne Allen, of Allen Arboriculture, and pupils from All Saints Church of England Primary School and Warwickshire Wildlife Trust volunteers were among those who helped with the work.

Funding from the Postcode Local Trust (part of the People's Postcode Lottery) of £20,000 and a further £5,000 from The Finnis Scott Foundation has covered costs.

Historic Coventry Trust has been working in partnership with the Council to restore the medieval building and its walled gardens and grounds, to create a heritage visitor centre. Cllr Jim O'Boyle, St Michael's ward councillor and Cabinet Member for Jobs and Regeneration at Coventry City Council, said:


City of Culture at Godiva Festival

This year's Godiva Festival saw over 115,000 attendees visit the War Memorial Park as part of the three-day event. Coventry City of Culture Trust was delighted to be working with Coventry City Council's Events Team to bring a different flavour to Sunday's proceedings.

The Trust worked with London Mela to take over the Rhythm Tent to present From Bhangra to Bollywood: The Sounds of Asian Britain, with acts including Asian Dub Foundation, Apache Indian, Zack Knight, Jasmin Walia, H Dhami, Raxstar - who performed alongside Coventry-based Sunit - Attaullah Khan Esakhelvi, Sanwal Esakhelvi and Abi Sampa.

Elsewhere, as part of the festival, the Trust worked with Serious Productions to bring Kinetika Bloco to the Main Stage crowds. The group, which is made up of an exuberant mix of 75 young dancers; drummers; and brass, woodwind and steel pan players, processed through the Main Stage crowds, finishing at the Coventry 2021 site in the Family Field.

The Main Stage itself saw the sensational Afriquoi bring their blistering fusion of 'ridiculously danceable' African rhythms to the Sunday afternoon programme with the help of Serious Productions. The unique five-piece mixed afro beats with electronics, hip-hop, soul and house and certainly had the crowd jumping. In the Family Field the Trust worked alongside Boudica Festival to host the Paradise Tent's



grand finale: **Stealing Sheep's** Suffragette Tribute. This marching band procession brought together 15 female drummers

and percussionists in unique costumes with AV production inspired by women, equality and empowerment.

COOMBE ABBEY

Coombe Abbey and its land has been a part of the city's life for almost 900 years. Back in the 12th century, the Abbey of Cumbe was a large monastery and now it is a top hotel, with acres of beautiful parkland for the people of Coventry and Warwickshire to enjoy. Here we take a look at Coombe's amazing story - and what's still to come.

History

The building started life as a monastery in the 12th century, but in 1539 was seized by King Henry VIII in the dissolution.

In 1603, Princess Elizabeth, daughter of King James I, came to Lancelot 'Capability' Brown to the Abbey to be educated and two landscape the grounds and create years later Guy Fawkes, Robert Catesby and the Gunpowder Plot conspirators plotted to kidnap her took ownership of the Abbey and and put her on the throne after blowing up Parliament. Thankfully the plot failed.

In 1622, the Craven family bought the Abbey and it stayed in their ownership for an incredible 300 years. The family built the

In 1964, Coventry City Council its 150 acre estate and two years later the park was opened to the public

In 1995 Coombe Abbey Hotel opened its doors for the first time The hotel later became a No Ordinary Hotel.

Designing the landscape

In 1771 Lancelot 'Capability' Brown was commissioned to modernise the landscape and created the serpentine lake, carried out extensive tree planting and designed several buildings, including a boathouse, menagerie and lodge gates. He recorded payments of £7,150 (more than £11m today).

Ghostly goings-on



Day trippers aren't the only ones to drop in at Coombe.

Ghosts that have been spotted over the years include Abbott Geoffrey, a monk who was murdered in 1345, who is spotted as a cowled figure 'floating around the grounds' and a Romany girl,

called Matilda, who is said to be dressed in rags and can be found near the stables. Other spirits reported at the hotel include a ghostly horseman and a Victorian woman who stands at the roadside.

New flu vaccine available

A local doctor is urging people aged over 65 to protect themselves from flu.

This year, a more effective vaccine is available in the UK for those aged 65 and over.

Dr Charles Ashton, Medical Director at South Warwickshire NHS Foundation Trust, says it is important because older adults' bodies do not respond as well to the flu vaccine due to their weaker immune systems. Older adults are also more likely to suffer complications from flu.

He said: "Flu is serious and kills on average 8,000 people a year. Adults over 65 are more likely to get flu and experience complications."

It is also free for eligible adults under 65, including pregnant women and those with long term health conditions. Children aged two to nine are also eligible.

To get your jab, just contact your GP or a participating pharmacy to arrange an appointment.


