What is Transforming Care?

Transforming Care (now the Learning Disability and Autism Programme) is a national programme that aims to improve the lives of children, young people and adults with learning disabilities and/or autism (including those with a mental health condition) who display behaviours viewed as challenging.

Aims of the programme

- 1. To improve quality of care for people with learning disability and/or autism
- 2. To improve quality of life for people with a learning disability and/or autism
- 3. To enhance community capacity, thereby **reducing inappropriate hospital admissions and length of stay.**

KEY TERMS

- Dynamic Support Register (DSR)
 - A register of adults and children with autism and learning disability at imminent risk of hospital admission.
- Intensive Support Team (IST)
 - A team of nurses, social workers and support workers with expertise in autism and learning disability. Works intensively with children and young people during a crisis to prevent a tier 4 admission.
- Key Workers
 - Independent workers experienced in working with CYP with autism and LD. They hold the system to account for providing person-centred care and planning for CYP aged 16 25. MIND provides this service.
- Care, Education and Treatment Reviews (CETRs)
 - NHSE requires children in hospital to have CTRs at least every 3 months to scrutinize the need for treatment in a hospital setting. The CETR
 - facilitates quick decisions about changes to packages of care, support and treatment
 - provides a forum for developing integrated solutions with health and social care.
 - Is chaired by a commissioner
 - involves an independent clinician and expert by experience.

How does The Learning Disability and Autism programme help children and young people in crisis?

Transforming Care is not a pathway or a service. It makes available resources and support if a child or young person

- · has a diagnosis of autism or a learning disability, and
- is in crisis and at risk of being admitted to hospital.

They are eligible for the **dynamic support register** (see Key Terms), if they or a parent/guardian consents.

Avoiding inappropriate hospital admission

- CYP on the Dynamic Support Register has access to IST, a keyworker, commissioner involvement, and a Care, Education and Treatment Review. (see left).
- This support can be mobilized on the same day that someone is notified that the individual is at imminent risk of admission.
- Every week, system leads scrutinize plans to reduce the risk of hospital admission and to ensure that barriers to delivering these plans are resolved quickly.
- Clinicians within CWPT CAMHS, CAMHS crisis home treatment team and discharge liaison teams use a validated Clinical Support Tool to assess a CYP's risk of admission to a tier 4 bed.
- The <u>children's transforming care team CWPT</u> support clinical teams to identify and add eligible CYP to the DSR.

· Early and effective discharge

If admission to a tier 4 bed cannot be avoided, the child or young person should be in hospital for the shortest period possible.

- A key worker advocates for the CYP and their family, and supports the unblocking of barriers to discharge.
- A CETR is held at least every 3 months to oversee the appropriateness of treatment in hospital and to support early and effective discharge planning.
- Alongside a multi agency team, a clinical commissioner from the CCG oversees planning and activity needed to progress the discharge.

How to access support for a child in crisis:

- 1. The CAMHS crisis home treatment team will be automatically notified if in A&E/paediatric ward.
- Contact the CAMHS crisis team 08081 966798.

Practitioners in these services will be able to initiate access the DSR or signpost to an appropriate service.

If you are concerned about a child being at risk of harm or think they need additional support in the community, a referral can be made to the Coventry Multi Agency Safeguarding Hub

What about children and young people who don't meet DSR criteria?

Some children and young people are not eligible for this support because

- they don't have a learning disability or autism diagnosis or
- have been assessed as being not at risk of admission to a tier 4 bed.

See below for links to services and support for individuals who are awaiting an autism diagnosis or who aren't at imminent risk of hospital admission:

<u>CWPT neurodevelopmental service</u> provides assessment and advice for individuals up to the age of 17 who need an assessment for ASD of ADHD.

<u>Children's Community Autism Support Service (CCASS)</u> is for children and young people (up until their 19th birthday) who are on the neurodevelopmental waiting list for an autism diagnosis, or who have previously received a diagnosis but require support.

The service is not open to anyone working with CAMHS RISE for therapeutic work or social care/early help or a family support worker.

The <u>Dimensions Tool</u> is a free online tool providing personalised information to support an individual's well-being and mental health.

How is the Learning Disability and Autism programme Delivered?

In Coventry and Warwickshire, the Learning Disability and Autism Executive Board oversees the programme. Its members are from:

- Coventry City Council
- Warwickshire County Council
- Coventry and Warwickshire CCG
- Coventry and Warwickshire Partnership Trust
- NHS England Specialist Commissioning

NHS England oversees the activity and performance of the programme. It uses the number of individuals in hospital as a key indicator of the programme's effectiveness.
