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

Education Facilities in the park include:

- Fully accessible bird hide with spectacular views of Warwickshire's largest heronry & woodland feeding station.
- Wildflower meadows open April to September.
- The Duck Decoy with pond dipping stages.
- Top Pool Lodge
- An orienteering course which is suitable for different abilities.
- Two children's play areas, a challenging climbing forest for children 12+ and a traditional area for younger children.

Education Facilities in the Visitors Centre include:

- The Field Studies Centre including science laboratory equipment.
- The Discovery Centre.

Coombe Country Park

Overview

Coombe Country Park is a beautiful historic parkland which offers many memorable countryside experiences. Within the parkland it offers 500 acres of fabulous gardens, woodlands, lakeside views, Deer park walks, and bird watching, during the summer months there is also a fantastic wild flower meadow. It has taken centuries and the vision of many individuals for the magnificent Country Park to reach its present splendour.

A large part of the site is classified as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) as recognition of its importance to wildlife. Its historic parkland is on the English Heritage register of historic parks and gardens.

Coombe Country Park has Warwickshire's largest Heronry, where over 60 pairs of Herons raise their young each year, couple this with the extensive biodiversity of habitats and wildlife found within the park then this offers a great ability to explore the wildlife and their environments through hands on activities. We offer a large range of exciting and involved activities with our aim to encourage a sense of wonder and respect for the environment through positive outdoor experiences. Most programme activities are linked to the National Curriculum and all build on the key skills of communication, thinking and working with others.

The park offers a wide range of facilities for your visit including a visitors centre, interactive discovery centre, café, gift shop, information centre and displays about Coombes history including artefacts found on site. When you book an activity with our Education Officers you will have the option to also book a designated area for your students to eat their lunches and store their belongings during the activity.

From 2010 Coombe Country Park has been honoured by being awarded the prestigious Green Flag Award, a national quality standard mark for parks and

open spaces and the LOtC Quality badge. We are a registered training centre with LANTRA and OCNwmr delivering courses from E1-L2.

We offer a variety of programmes and activities throughout the year with all of our programmes linked to the National Curriculum. The programmes we offer are designed to work alongside programmes of study within schools as an extension of children's knowledge and learning or as a starter session to a new topic focus.

Outreach activities

As well as programmes delivered within the park itself we also offer outreach activities within your base. These range from school assemblies to whole day activities working with schools; museums; colleges; universities and even Women Institutes and local natural history societies. The list is endless! Bespoke Activities

Pre-school and early years

0 - 4 years of age

Overview of activities

Autumn Changes

The pupils will use their senses to explore the park and the things around them. Pupils are encouraged to look at the different colours of autumn and express their own thoughts on how leafs and features within the park change during the autumn season. The children will also be given the opportunity to search for mini beasts within the woodland and look at different types of animal homes. At the end of the session pupils will be given the opportunity to feed the birds and also create a natural collage as we walk back to the visitors centre.

First Nature

You will use your senses to explore the park and the things around us. Pupils will be given the opportunity to find and feel different textures and take a bark rubbing of their favourite tree, look for different colours they can see within the park and will be encouraged to listen and focus on the smells around them using a special magic jewel. They will also be given the opportunity to search for mini beasts within the woodland and look at different types of homes animals live in. At the end of the session they will feed the birds and create a natural collage as we walk back to the visitors centre.

Forest School

This programme can be run as either a standalone 2 hour session or as a rolling programme designed to help children explore nature first hand through practical experiences, art and stories. Pupils are encouraged to take part in innovative, creative and diverse activities, which stimulate and develop their own learning styles, reinforce gained knowledge, boost self-esteem and encourages interaction with others.

The Hungry Caterpillar – summer term only

Pupils will listen to the story of 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' and then go and explore the meadow to try and find some very hungry caterpillars and their friends. After looking at the different creatures we have found in the meadow the children are given the opportunity to create a Sticky picture of foods the caterpillar might like to eat as we walk back to the Field Study Centre.

The Three Little Pigs

Pupils listen to the story of 'The Three Little Pig'. They will then be given the opportunity to build a shelter for 'The Three Little Pigs' (either in small groups or individually) and then see if they can blow their shelters down.

The Teeny Weeny tadpole

Pupils will listen to the story of 'The Teeny Weeny Tadpole' before being given the opportunity to explore the pond to see if we can find any tadpoles and their friends.

Primary

Key Stage 1 - 25 - 11 years

Autumn Changes

KS1

The pupils will use their senses to explore the park and the things around them. Pupils are encouraged to look at the different colours of autumn and express their own thoughts on how leafs and features within the park change during the autumn season. The children will also be given the opportunity to search for mini beasts within the woodland and look at different types of animal homes. At the end of the session pupils will be given the opportunity to feed the birds and also create a natural collage as we walk back to the visitors centre.

First Nature KS1

The Pupils will use their senses to explore the park and the things around them. They will be given the opportunity to find and feel different textures and take a bark rubbing of their favourite tree, look for different colours they can see within the park and will also be encouraged to listen and focus on the sounds and smells around them using a special magic jewel. Pupils will also be given the opportunity to search for mini beasts within the woodland and look at different types of animal homes. At the end of the session children will be given the opportunity to feed the birds and also create a natural collage as we walk back to the visitors centre.

The Very Hungry Caterpillar – summer term only

KS₁

Pupils will listen to the story of 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' and then go and explore the meadow to try and find some very hungry caterpillars and their friends. After looking at the different creatures we have found in the meadow

the children are given the opportunity to create a Sticky picture of foods the caterpillar might like to eat as we walk back to the Field Study Centre.

The Three Little Pigs

KS1

Pupils listen to the story of 'The Three Little Pig'. They will then be given the opportunity to build a shelter for 'The Three Little Pigs' (either in small groups or individually) and then see if they can blow their shelters down.

The Teeny Weeny tadpole

KS1

Pupils will listen to the story of 'The Teeny Weeny Tadpole' before being given the opportunity to explore the pond to see if we can find any tadpoles and their friends.

Animal Adaptations

KS 1 and KS 2

This programme gives pupils the opportunity to explore different animals and the adaptations that help them live within their own specific environment. Bird costumes are used to illustrate the adaptations of birds found within the park and field sampling techniques will be used to record the animals that the pupils discover within the park.

Art in the Park KS 1 and KS2

Pupils will get the opportunity to create art from natural materials found within the woodland. Working as either individuals or in groups pupils art work could include 2D or 3D pieces.

Discovering Fresh Water Life

KS 1 and KS 2

This programme gives the Pupils an opportunity to look at the freshwater habitat and the different animals and wildlife that live within it. Children will be asked to use field sampling techniques to identify the different invertebrates and animals that the habitat supports.

Focus on Herons - March - June only

KS 1 and KS 2

This programme offers pupils the opportunity to explore the life of a Heron. It delivers an introduction to Herons and how they have adapted to live in their surroundings. Pupils will also have the opportunity to observe Herons and other water birds in their natural environment.

Forest School KS 1 and KS 2

This programme can be run as either a standalone 2 hour session, a whole day or as a rolling programme. The programme is designed to help children explore nature first hand through practical experiences, art and stories. Children are encouraged to take part in innovative, creative and diverse activities, which stimulate and develop their own learning styles, reinforce gained knowledge, boost self-esteem and encourages interaction with others.

Habitats - Summer time only

KS 1 and KS 2

This programme allows pupils an opportunity to compare and contrast three different habitats within the park. They will be able to use field study techniques to identify the different invertebrates and animals that live within each habitat. For top end Ks2 this programme also offers the ability to look closely at biodiversity and environmental impacts.

Monsters in Miniature - Summer time only

KS 1 and KS 2

This programme gives the pupils an opportunity to compare and contrast two different habitats, (Meadow and Woodland), and the wildlife that lives within each habitat. Pupils will be asked to use field sampling techniques to identify the different invertebrates and animals that each habitat supports.

Woods and Water KS 1 and KS 2

This programme gives pupils an opportunity to compare and contrast two different habitats (woodland and water), and the wildlife that lives within it. Pupils will use field sampling techniques to identify the different invertebrates and animals that each habitat supports and the links between the two habitats.

Environmental Explorers - All day programme

KS 2

This programme looks at biodiversity and sustainability. Using a variety of games and activities pupils will gain an understanding of different habitats and the life they support and how we can sustain them for the future.

Orienteering Programme

KS 2

This programme gives pupils a combined activity offering a basic understanding of map reading with a fun and interactive activity throughout the park. Pupils are shown how to read the site orienteering maps and afterwards are split into small groups to work together around the orienteering course.

River Study KS 2

During this programme Pupils are given the opportunity to expand and develop a variety of field study skills through observing the river and its surrounding landscape. Pupils will be given the opportunity to take measurements of different aspects of the as well as investigating the invertebrates and animals that live within the river system. Understanding will be gained of the main features.

Shelter Building KS 2

Working in teams, pupils are given the opportunity to build a shelter out of the natural materials they find around them. After completion pupils are given the opportunity to assess their own work and that of their peers and to think about how they could develop their ideas and building techniques.

Team games Programme

KS₂

This programme offers pupils the opportunity to explore challenges face on. The pupils are split into small groups in which they will have to overcome a selection of challenging activities. The games are designed to develop team work, creative thinking skills, working to a deadline, communication, reflection of their abilities to improve their own teams' performance and respect for others.

The Gun Powder plot

KS₂

Pupils will be given the opportunity to find out about how Coombe Country Park had a major role to play in the Gun powder plot.

Woodland Survey

KS 2

This programme looks at trees as living plants and how the woodland habitat is created. Pupils are encouraged to measure and estimate the age of trees as well as the woodland habitat and how it supports the biodiversity of animal life within in it. Pupils will use a variety of Field Study Techniques.

Woods and Water

KS 2

This programme gives the pupils the opportunity to compare & contrast two distinct habitats and the wildlife found in each. Pupils use field sampling techniques to identify the different flora & fauna found in areas providing the opportunity to compare & contrast the two habitats.

Outreach programmes

Assemblies:

Caring for our environment and the wildlife that live within it

This programme is a whole school assembly that focuses on the plants and animals that we should find within the school grounds. The assembly looks at life cycles and how the biodiversity of species can be affected by changes in the habitat. We also look at simple ways in which we can encourage animals and animals into the differing habitats within the school grounds. The assembly uses costumes and props to help deliver the message of biodiversity.

Recycling

Through interactive and creative games and activities pupils will learn about why it is important to Recycle, Reduce and Reuse as well as discussing ways in which we can cut down on waste within the school grounds.

Animal adaptations

Pupils will learn about the different birds and how they are adapted to their own specific habitats by the use of costumes and props. Pupils will also be encouraged to survey the birds found within their school grounds as either a pre visit or follow up session.

Activities:

Animal feeders and homes

Follow up activities to the Caring for our environment assembly where, using field sampling techniques survey the plants and animals found within the school grounds or create feeders and homes to encourage increased biodiversity within the school grounds.

Up-cycling

Follow up session from the Recycling assembly where pupils are given the opportunity to create new things from old. For example bird feeders, Junk models or musical instruments.

A basic introduction to Compass and direction.

Through games and activities pupils gain a basic understanding of the points of the compass and direction culminating in a basic orienteering exercise within the school grounds.

Secondary

Key Stage 3 − 5 11 - 18 years

Art in the Park

Pupils will get the opportunity to create art from natural materials found within the woodland. Working as either individuals or in groups pupils art work could include 2D or 3D pieces. This opens up the subject of creative thinking, writing, design, etc. and can be part of many exercises. It can also be used as a form of interpretation for checking the understanding of other sessions.

Bushcraft Survival

This programme follows the ethos of the Forest School Programme and can be run as either a one off session or a running programme. Develops both team and communication skills

Micro-habitats

This programme gives the pupils an opportunity to compare and contrast different habitats, and micro habitats that they support. Using field sampling techniques pupils will be given the opportunity to identify the different invertebrates, animals and plant life that each habitat supports.

Orienteering

This programme gives pupils a combined activity offering a basic understanding of map reading with a fun and interactive activity throughout the park. Pupils are shown how to read the site orienteering maps and afterwards are split into small groups to work together around the orienteering course.

River Study

During this programme pupils are given the opportunity to expand and develop a variety of field study skills through observing the river and its surrounding landscape. Pupils will be given the opportunity to take

measurements of different aspects of the as well as investigating the invertebrates and animals that live within the river system. Understanding will be gained of the main features of the river system. Up to and including GCSE+ level work.

Shelter Building

Working in teams, pupils are given the opportunity to build a shelter out of the natural materials they find around them. After completion pupils are given the opportunity to assess their own work and that of their peers and to think about how they could develop their ideas and building techniques. It also provides the opportunity if required to examine the use of materials and structures in construction.

Team games

This programme offers pupils the opportunity to work together and explore how to deal with challenges. The sessions are created out of a bank of activities that are tailored to the ability of the group. The pupils are split into small groups in which they will have to overcome a selection of challenging activities. The games are designed to develop team work, creative thinking skills, working to a deadline, communication, reflection of their abilities to improve their own teams' performance and respect for others.

Travel and Tourism

Pupils will have the opportunity to look at different groups of people that use the park and their conflict of interest as well as the environmental impact of the activities on site.

City & Guilds

This course covers a set range of units including Tool & Equipment Maintenance; Planting & Establishing Plants and Historic Landscapes. It is accredited through Warwickshire College and gives a direct link into their Level 2 or 3 courses or our own Level 2 course.

Entry Level Taster Course.

This course has flexible start dates throughout the year; it has a minimum attendance rate of 6/7 days for the learner to be able to achieve the qualification. It can be booked as a block or over 7 weeks during one term.

Level 1 and 2 Courses.

These courses are available for enrolment in September and January. The learner will need to attend:

- One day a week for one academic year for the Award and Certificate; or for two years for the Diploma;
- Two or three days a week for one academic year for the Award, Certificate & Diploma.

To progress from Level 1 to Level 2 at:

- One day a week takes a minimum of three years;
- Two days a week takes a minimum of two years to achieve a Level 2 Certificate;
- Three days a week for a minimum of two years to achieve a Level 2 Diploma.

We offer these courses for 1-3 days a week, 10.00am-2.30pm, Wednesday through to Friday.

Birthday Parties

FAQ's Day Activities

Q) How many members of staff do we need to bring?

- A) We recommend that more than the recommended ratios are brought with you on visits to the park. Ratios for each Key Stage are as follows;
 - Under 5's = 1:4,
 - KS1 = 1:6.
 - KS2 = 1:8
 - Ks3+ = 1:10

Please note that during the River study programme 2 members of staff per activity group is required so a minimum of 4 members of staff.

Activity leaders DO NOT make up the required ratio for your group.

Q) What should we bring with us?

A) All pupils should be dressed appropriately for the day and the activities that your pupils will be taking part in.

Q) What happens if it is bad weather?

A) There are no wet weather alternatives for any activity. All attending must be prepared for all weather conditions. In severe weather (strong gales, torrential rain, blizzard) the activity may be cancelled, if we cancel we can either rearrange the date or refund the money.

Q) I have to do a risk assessment; can I come to Coombe to do it? Can I have a copy of your risk assessment?

A) We encourage pre-visit checks so that you can write your own Risk Assessment for the day. Feel free to contact us to arrange a time. Our activities are all risk assessed and copies can be made available on request.

Q) How long is each activity?

A) All activities are based on a 2 hour session which allows you to book mornings, afternoons or all day.

Q) Can we adjust timings?

A) We try to be flexible in timing your activities if we have adequate notice. How long is each activity?

Q) Is there anywhere to eat lunches?

A) There are numerous picnic benches and areas to sit outside. If you book our team for a whole day a room is included in the price for your lunch. Rooms can also be booked separately and at an additional cost.

Q) How much will the activities cost?

A) For general costing's please refer to our website, or contact us for specific details.

Q) Do we need to pay for car/coach parking?

A) This is included in the price of education bookings; you will receive your passes in your confirmation email or by post.

Q) How do we pay for the activities?

A) We will invoice you for the total cost of the programme after the visit.

Q) What if we just want to visit the park without using your education services?

A) If you are planning a self-led trip please send us a self-led visit form available on our website and we will let you know if we can accommodate you over the period.

Car parking charges for coaches, Minibuses and cars do apply. For Cost please refer to our website or contact us for specific details.

Room hire may be available for lunches at none busy times of the year.

Terms and conditions for education visits.

- 1. Provisional bookings should be made by telephone. We will then send booking forms to the Visit Organiser.
- 2. To confirm a provisional booking, the booking form should be returned within 21 days of making a provisional booking. If booking forms are not returned within 21 days the provisional booking may be cancelled and the dates offered to another group.
- 3. Course fees will be charged for the number of students booked (this can be altered at any time up to 7 days before the visit) or for those attending on the day of the visit which ever is greater. Car and or Coach parking is included in the fee.
- 4. Course fees are set prices per student per session. For current prices refer to our website or contact us.
- 5. Under current legislation course fees are exempt from VAT.
- 6. An invoice for the course fees will be sent to Visit Organisers after the visit and must be paid immediately upon receipt of the invoice.
- 7. Groups cancelling bookings up to four weeks before the date of the visit will be liable to pay the full amount of the visit, unless the date is subsequently filled by another group.
- 8. Visit Leaders** must bring a full list of students and adult helpers attending on the day of the visit.
- 9. Visit leaders are responsible for ensuring that they bring on the required number of adults with as discussed at the time of the booking.
- 10. It is the responsibility of the Visit Organiser to notify the service of any known relevant medical conditions at the time of booking and to update with more detail if necessary at the start of the visit.
- 11. To ensure a safe visit, the Visit Leader and other adult helpers will be expected to take an active part in the visit and will be entirely responsible for discipline, safety and overall control of the group.

- 12. Although the service carries out risk assessments for all activities and will make these available on request, it is recommended that Visit Leaders should also carry out their own risk assessments for the visit.
- 13. It is recommended that Visit Leaders carryout a pre-visit check to familiarise themselves with the study area.
- 14. Although service staff are trained in first aid and will carry first aid kits, it remains the responsibility of the Visit Leader to provide first aid and any necessary medical care to students.
- 15. It is the responsibility of the Visit Leader to ensure that students have parental permission for the visit and to bring with them a list of emergency contact and medical details for each student on the visit.
- 16. At all times during the visit, the Visit Leader will retain responsibility for the safety and welfare of students including during break times when the service staff may not be present.
- 17. The school or other group, through the LEA or other insurance, as appropriate, will indemnify the service against all claims arising from any loss or damage, or injury or death to participants and any third parties arising from the educational visit and will, during the period of the visit, maintain an insurance policy with a reputable insurance company for an amount of not less than £5 million in respect of any one claim. The amount of such insurance shall not limit the liability of the school, group or LEA to the service.
- 18. During a visit led by the service staff, the staff member will co-ordinate the activities of the group and will advise the group of any particular known hazards that may apply on the day of the visit.
- 19. The service reserves the right to cancel or terminate a visit at any time if our staff consider that to continue with the visit would be hazardous to themselves, students or members of the public.
- 20. The service reserves the right to exclude any individuals from a visit if our staff feel that to allow them to continue would be hazardous to the individual or detrimental to the quality of experience we are able to provide to the rest of the group or to others.
