Farce:

a comic dramatic work using buffoonery and horseplay and typically including crude characterisation and ludicrously improbable situations.

Jonas Johnasson's *The Girl Who Saved the King of Sweden* is all of the above, and more. It is a follow up to his international bestseller *The Hundred Year Old Man Who Climbed Out the Window and Disappeared*, and all but one member of the group agreed this first novel was more enjoyable even though there were notable similarities.

Our novel this month was described by members as hysterical, clever, interesting, entertaining and silly. Most felt the book was a tad too long and could have easily had one hundred pages cut. Some concurred the book was a bit of a 'plodder' with events unfolding at the same tempo throughout. This didn't quite make it a page-turner for some who felt they just wanted to get to the end.

So, what is the point? The plot is so farcical that, when you describe it to

somebody who hasn't read it, you sound as though you are making it up as you go along – like a bizarre dream. A style of writing you either love or hate, yet all members agreed that the novel was well-written and Johnasson has a real talent for interweaving historical and political events across a vast time scale with two parallel plots that eventually meet.

The deal-breaker, it seems, is sharing Jonasson's sense of humour; for those members who found the novel laugh-out-loud funny, this would motivate them to seek out his future work. For other,s the style of farcical plot superseding character development and emotional connection was perhaps not one they would be in a hurry to revisit.
