

Remote Education Information

What should my child expect from remote education?

Our remote learning offer will evolve over time in line with our students' needs. We are delivering a blend of live lessons and virtual learning assignments.

We teach the same curriculum remotely as we do in school wherever possible and appropriate. However, we have needed to make some adaptations in some subjects. For example, there is a greater effect on our ability to offer practical lessons.

How long can I expect work set by the school to take my child each day?

Students are provided with remote education for 5 hours a day. These hours include both direct teaching and time for students to complete tasks or assignments independently.

Accessing remote education

How will my child access any online remote education you are providing?

Students are to log into the Virtual Learning Environment (VLE) <u>Coventry Extended Learning Centre-Home - Home (sharepoint.com)</u> and then select Access Remote Learning. They need to log in with their celches.coventry.sch.uk username. Once they have successfully logged on, they need to click on the relevant teaching group to access the remote learning resources.

If my child does not have digital or online access at home, how will you support them to access remote education?

If you do not have necessary access to a device or to the internet at home, we are providing laptops and devices to provide an internet connection. If required, printed materials will be provided by the school.

How will my child be taught remotely?

Delivery includes both direct teaching through live lessons and time for students to complete tasks or assignments independently. At CELC we will use a combination of approaches to teach students remotely. The teaching approaches that we use are as follows:

- Live lessons
- Online assignments
- Recordings made by teachers
- Printed paper packs produced by teachers (e.g. workbooks, worksheets)
- Textbooks and reading books students have at home
- Commercially available websites supporting the teaching of specific subjects or areas, including video clips or sequences, e.g. MyMaths
- Oak National Academy lessons
- Long-term project work and/or internet research activities

What are your expectations for my child's engagement and the support that we as parents and carers should provide at home?

- Students are expected to log on to their remote learning each day and complete all the live lessons and assignments that have been set by their teachers.
- During live lessons the parent needs to oversee the lesson and need to support their child by providing a quiet room in a public place where the student can concentrate.
- If there are any problems with the student accessing their remote learning, then parents or carers must contact the school for support.

How will you check whether my child is engaging with their work and how will I be informed if there are concerns?

Staff will regularly check that students are engaged in their remote education. If there is a problem, then the student's key worker will notify parents or carers of any issues.

How will you assess my child's work and progress?

Feedback can take many forms and may not always mean extensive written comments for individual children. CELC's approach to feeding back on student work is as follows:

- Students will submit completed work to teachers on the VLE. Maths work will be completed online using My Maths.
- Teachers will contact students to discuss their work at least once a week and record summaries of these feedback sessions in the students' case notes.

Extra support for students with additional needs

How will you work with me to help my child who needs additional support from adults at home to access remote education?

We recognise that some students, for example students with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), may not be able to access remote education without support from adults at home. We acknowledge the difficulties this may place on families, and we will work with individual parents and carers to support these students.
