Outdoor Education Prepares Path to Success

Since the initiation of Outdoor Education at Whitmore Park Annexe the external spaces have certainly felt better and brighter to be around. Pupils have been busily creating bug hotels, installing bamboo screening and planting flowers to make the outdoor areas a pleasant place to be.

Vicky Dunne, Education Manager from the Warwickshire Wildlife Trust, is tasked with empowering our pupils to develop a love for the outdoors and build an appreciation for the important part that our environment plays in our supporting our mental and physical wellbeing. Since starting the outdoor work at WPA, we now have a flower bed, hanging baskets, bamboo screening, bird boxes and an insect hotel.

More recently pupils have been working alongside Vicky and Mrs Ingram to create a path for the school community to gain access to the building via the garden area. The path made from bark will be particularly beneficial for pupils use different entry and exit points to access their lessons. As part of the Outdoor Education Programme, pupils have also had the opportunity to visit Brandon Marsh Nature Reserve. The trip took pupils on an exploration of the vast natural habitat enjoyed by a range of wildlife at Brandon Marsh and a hot cocoa was well received by pupils at the end of what was a very cold day.

Wellbeing Spotlight: Exam Anxiety – Is it something to worry about?

As many students are preparing for tests and exams in the summer term, media reports focus on the stress and anxiety that some students can feel at this time. For some, the effects of stress can be minor or even positive but research suggests that one in seven students can feel highly anxious about tests. Here at Whitmore Park Annexe we have been working hard to tackle the concerns and worries our pupils will be experiencing in the run up to their GCSEs.



Tackling this common issue forms a critical element of our wellbeing

curriculum, particularly as some of our pupils have a shared tendency towards heightened anxiety at key assessment points. This term, pupils have been invited to take part in a series of sessions to help them understand some important facts about exam stress and anxiety, whilst sharing some simple ways that it can be effectively managed.

The **STEPS** programme (Strategies to Tackle Exam Pressure and Stress) has been developed by Professor David Putwain at Liverpool John Moore's University and successfully delivered in a variety of mainstream and alternative education settings, such as ours. During our first three sessions, we have discussed what it feels like to experience exam anxiety and recognising the signs, explored how we can challenge negative thinking through positive self-talk and been introduced to some useful ways to help us feel calmer in particularly stressful situations.

Some participants have already started to realise the benefits of STEPS. We have been told they "liked that everyone was in it together" and the sessions meant "I didn't feel so alone" worrying about exams, with others stating they now "felt more relaxed and knew it was a natural feeling to worry about exams". There has been a wonderfully supportive atmosphere amongst those attending; one student in particular fed back they liked that it "doesn't feel rushed" and they found "the quizzes at the start" useful in helping them "to remember" what we have discussed. With three sessions remaining, pupils will investigate the best ways to plan and approach revision, talk about how to get motivated and the benefits of visualisation, with the hope they will understand what strategies work best for them. Working towards exams can create feelings of worry and being under pressure, however we hope with these sessions, pupils will feel they are more prepared to successfully tackle their summer exams.

Drapers' Hall Visit Provides Pupils with a Musical Masterclass

Just before half-term in February, Mr Stannard from Coventry Music invited young people from Whitmore Park Annexe (HES) and Mr Green to spend one of their regular Monday afternoon Music sessions at Drapers' Hall - the grand building opposite the old cathedral ruins. Managed by the Historic Coventry Trust, Drapers' Hall has had different roles through the years - accommodating the Drapers' Guild and as a Magistrates' Court, as well as in its latest incarnation, as the home of the City's Music Service. During the Second World War the basement was used as an air-raid shelter, and it is amazing to think how close the building was to being destroyed.

The beautiful ballroom with its chandeliers and resonant acoustics was a wonderful space for HES students: Madison, Ed and Iona to spend some time relaxing and making music in such a luxurious environment. This certainly got the creative juices flowing and we all enjoyed the opportunity. Madison and Ed worked on the finer details of a song composition/performance for vocals/quitar/conga drums and Iona practised Abba's Mamma Mia for cornet and piano.

HES students demonstrated a mature approach to their music studies and expressed their appreciation afterwards. Asif Takolia, Assistant Head Teacher, commented that 'as a service we recognise the value of learning outside the classroom and the positive impact this has on pupils learning within the classroom. Our students thoroughly enjoyed the experience, and we hope Mr Stannard is planning another visit soon!

Virtual Reality Workshop takes Pupils to the Himalayas and Beyond

On Thursday 24th March the Hospital Education Service hosted a Virtual Reality workshop for KS4 pupils. The workshop was in partnership with Coventry Libraries and their pioneering Digital Spaces project which aims to provide library users with high-quality virtual reality and immersive audio experiences. The workshop gave pupils and staff an opportunity to experience a range of BBC Award-winning content that included a enthralling seat aboard a Lancaster Bomber right into the heart of Nazi-occupied Europe. The audio was broadcasted at the time in 1943 to the British Public by BBC War Correspondent Wynford Vaughan-Thomas as he gave an insight into what the brave service people had to go through during the second world war.

Other stories included a climb up Mount Everest and starts off in the heart of the French Alps and follows some of the world's best mountain athletes pursuing their sports and explaining their motivations behind it. The journey takes you to the most extreme VR locations filmed on this planet and finish on the summit of Everest itself. Pupils were able to witness what it's like to be engulfed in a Himalayan avalanche, cross a crevasse and stare deep into its depths, take a huge rock climbing fall, camp under the stars, and soak in the view from the 'Top of the World'.

Thomas, our ICT and Digital Ambassador, enjoyed the experience and commented 'It felt you were actually there and you feel like you are part of the journey. The Everest experience was the best for me'.

Air Museum Visit sees Pupils Engagement Take Off

We all decided we would not have felt safe flying in that! However, the most exciting exhibits, were the fighter jets and bombers. Students really enjoyed sitting in the cockpits and visualising life as a bomber pilot. This was their favourite part of the trip.

TJ commented 'It is amazing to see how small the cockpits actually are, with so little room to move and how do the pilots remember which knob is which?"

A favourite for everyone, was the Vulcan XL360, 'The City of Coventry'. We were all amazed at the size of this V bomber and its huge wingspan. The weather was very kind to us and we were able to have a picnic outside, in the shadow of fighter jets and helicopters. The students enjoyed the trip and would certainly go again. 

Aishah in year 11 has on her weekends been learning to fly a Piper-Warrior light aircraft as part of her ambition to gain a PPL (Private Pilot License). Aishah has done extremely well to gain a scholarship to complete her PPL and will be taking off from Tatenhill Airport in Burton-on-Trent.

Aishah's love of aviation has allowed to her to experience simulator flying of Boeing 737, 747 and 787 Max. These are the most common commercial airliner jets typically used to make journeys across the world.

In September Aishah hopes to take her next step towards her ambition by studying an Aviation and Airport Operations course which will give her a solid foundation towards her career aspirations.


We look forward to welcoming Mrs Gregg to our team and I'm sure you will see her around very soon.
