## Ofsted praises Coventry Children's Services with 'GOOD' rating

Coventry City Council's Children's Services have been rated as 'good' following an Ofsted inspection.

The inspection found that the Council services supporting some of the most vulnerable in the city had "improved in all areas" with all areas rated as "good."

The report said:

"The voice of the child is important in Coventry and there is a strong participation offer that ensures that children's voices are heard and

listened to at all levels of the local authority."

The strength in relationships between Coventry City Council and partner agencies such as health and the police was also a strong theme from the report.

**Clir Patricia Seaman**, Cabinet Member for Children and Young People, said:

"We are delighted with the report from Ofsted. It shows the incredible amount of hard work and care that has gone into improving Children's Services in the city from our own incredibly dedicated staff through to the wide-ranging partners we work with.

"Everyone should be proud of the achievements and the progress made, but this is not the end of our journey. The children and families in Coventry deserve the very best and we will continue to strive to improve to achieve 'outstanding' next time."

### **Former Toy** Museum to undergo refurb

An exciting project is underway to bring back to life a much-loved historic building in Coventry city centre known for decades as the 'Toy Museum'.

Historic Coventry Trust has secured grants of £180,000 from Historic England and £100,000 from the Architectural Heritage Fund to start the next chapter in the history of Whitefriars' Gate in Much Park Street.

#### Fly-tipping warning

Since the beginning of April, the street enforcement team has served 24 fixed penalty notices for fly-tipping offences. All of which have been paid.

Failure to pay fixed penalty will lead to prosecutions. When the street enforcement team follow up a report of fly-tipping they will always gather evidence from the items dumped.

Officers recently investigated a case in Humber Avenue where the people involved confirmed it was a mistake to leave the cardboard boxes by the bin and do accept it was their responsibility to ensure they disposed of their waste correctly and agreed to pay a fixed penalty notice.

Cllr Naeem Akhtar, Chair of the Council's Scrutiny Co-ordination Cttee, and St Michael's Ward Councillor, said:

"I'm really pleased that the work of enforcement officers is leading to fixed penalty fines."

Cllr Abdul Khan, Cabinet Member for Policing and Equalities at the Council, said:

"We are encouraging local people to report fly-tipping and to provide any evidence they can pass on."

"We are successfully penalising people, but we need to keep on top of the problem, we can't be complacent."

Other examples of where fines have been issued include: Sewall Highway, Upper Stoke Crabmill Lane, Foleshill.

- You can report fly-tipping incidents anonymously at coventry.gov.uk/flytipping or calling **0808 583 4333.**
- Help on disposing of all unwanted items including bulky waste can be found on the website at coventry.gov.uk/bulkywaste
- The Council works in partnership with Emmaus Coventry and Warwickshire and for a small charge, can collect bulky household waste.
- Alternatively, you can get rid of these items yourself by taking them to the Household Recycling and Disposal Centre (the tip).

#### Coventry landlords issued with formal cautions

Coventry City Council has issued formal cautions to two local landlords who illegally evicted their tenants.

Both Landlords gave their tenants incorrect paperwork instructing them to leave their homes which the tenants believed was correct and therefore proceeded to leave.

In both cases the tenants contacted housing enforcement after presenting themselves as homeless. Neither landlord reinstated the tenant when invited to do so.

Coventry City Council's Housing Enforcement and Property Licensing Team are keen to remind landlords that in order to legally evict tenants they must serve a valid notice to guit and then use this to obtain a possession order at court anything other than this is likely to constitute a criminal offence.

#### Light rail project a step closer

The Coventry Very Light Rail Project has taken a major step forward as the Council and WMG, at the University of Warwick, launch a demo site for its light rail system.



Researchers and engineers at WMG have worked alongside track design experts at Ingerop to create, design and build the demo site, including the unique track system, which also enables rapid installation - minimising disruption to local properties and businesses.

The track is significantly cheaper compared to current tram tracks. The vehicle itself is lightweight, and there will be no overhead power supply along the route. The site will be based at WMG.

**Cllr Jim O'Boyle**, Cabinet Member for Jobs, Regeneration and Climate Change, said:

"This new track test site is a key part of our work to demonstrate the viability of the breakthrough technology being used."

Coventry Very Light rail is being led by Coventry City Council and has received funding from the West Midlands Combined Authority, the Coventry and Warwickshire Local Enterprise Partnership and Coventry City Council.

#### **Climate Change Board**

The project is also supported by an Independent Climate Change Board made up of local businesses, public and community organisations which is driving forward changes to address Coventry's impact on climate change and the environment.

Margot James, Executive Chair for WMG at the University of Warwick, and former minister for culture, communications and creative industries, is the chair of the Coventry Climate Change Board, Margot said:

"Coventry's Climate Change Board is bringing together key city stakeholders to draw up a set of actions that will meet the carbon reduction targets set by the Council."

## Coventry first in UK to use new road reconstruction and recycling technique

Recycol, a new road reconstruction and recycling technique, is being rolled out in Coventry thanks to a partnership between Coventry City Council and Colas.

Coventry will be the first city in the UK to use the process, which involves using specialist equipment to recycle and regenerate the top surfaces of roads in a single pass, which means roads can be quickly repaired.

**Cllr Patricia Hetherton**, Cabinet Member for City Services, said:

"Not only will Recycol mean we can fix road surfaces faster and more economically, it's also better for the environment as it makes use of recycled materials, which helps reduce carbon emissions."

## FOSTER FOR COVENTRY

A new fostering film called 'Childhood' has been launched to raise awareness of the need for more foster carers and Coventry is playing its part.

In a ground-breaking national collaboration, 56 Local Authorities across England have worked together to share ideas and jointly fund the creation of a short film to raise awareness of fosterina.

'Childhood', highlights the impact of neglect on children, particularly brothers and sisters who may be left at times to try and care for each other.

It shows the journey of

'Sophie' and 'Charlie' from a very difficult home situation to eventually regaining their childhood.

Cllr Pat Seaman, Cabinet Member for Children and Young People, said:

"Sadly, it's as important as ever to get the message out as widely as possible that there is still a great need for foster carers, not only in our city but across the country."

#### **Turning** lives around

A social work team has been shortlisted for a prestigious, national award in recognition of its extraordinary practice.

Coventry City Council's Reunification Project has been selected as a finalist for Team of the Year in the annual Social Worker of the Year Awards.

The project started in June 2021 and has already



supported numerous children and young people to return to the care of their families.

The team is innovative, creative and has delivered lasting results, working with families to provide high quality tailored support.

Every child and young person who has been part of project has seen a major turnaround in their lives over the last year and every member of the team has gone above and beyond in working to help families make the changes that were needed.

### **Funding hopes** for family hubs

**Coventry City Council** has been selected to apply to join the national Family Hub and Start for Life Programme so it can expand its work and help even more people.

Coventry currently runs eight Family Hubs around the city to offer local support to residents.

They offer support to families with children of all ages up to 19 years, with services including learning support, infant feeding and parent/child relationships.

If successful the Council could secure a further £4m towards its family hub services over the next three years.

Cllr Patricia Seaman, Cabinet Member for Children and Young People, said:

"Our Family Hubs have been a great success and have helped so many people since they were introduced.

"We are very proud of our work to put families at the heart of all we do, and this is a chance for us to take the next step and help lead the way in family care and support."

#### New children's home

Councillors have backed plans to build a new children's home in the city.

It will allow children to live near their family, friends and support groups and continue their education while social workers investigate the best long-term approach.

Same day/short term care can be needed for a number of reasons, including where police are involved with a family and where a parent or carer is admitted to hospital as an emergency.

Cllr Patricia Seaman, Cabinet Member for Children and Young People, said:

"There is sometimes a need for swift action, where a child or young person needs to be taken out of the family situation that same day.

"By opening a new specialist home, we would be ensuring that children in need are given help when they need it, and in their own city."

## Car fit for a princess

A car owned by Diana, Princess of Wales, that was believed to be a gift from King Charles III and a vehicle that helped to launch a range of Barbie toys can be seen for the first time in years at **Coventry Transport Museum.** 



Thirty vehicles, many of which were made in Coventry, have been brought out of the museum's storage collection and can now be viewed in a space previously reserved for temporary exhibitions and events within the museum to all visitors to enjoy more of the collection.

The new gallery - Behind the Scenes: Wheels and Workers – which is now open, features a Coventry-made Jaquar XJS that became trapped in Bosnia in the 1990s and was later returned to the UK, painted bright pink and used as a prototype by Mattell to create Barbie's toy vehicle is included in the display.
