# City's Adult Education Service looking good

Staff and learners at Coventry City Council's Adult Education Service are celebrating following their recent successful Ofsted inspection.

A team of five inspectors visited numerous Adult Education classes during the inspection, spoke with learners and analysed survey results, leading to the service maintaining its overall "Good" classification.

Inspectors praised the service's broad selection of local classes. They also noted that learners benefit from having knowledgeable and experienced tutors who impart the knowledge, abilities, and attitudes necessary for them to advance in their academic endeavours, apprenticeships, or personal skill-building.

Inspectors could tell that learners and apprentices enjoyed their classes and gained confidence throughout the fourday inspection.

Cllr Kindy Sandhu, Cabinet Member for Education, said: "I am really pleased that Ofsted has recognised the positive impact that the Council's Adult Education Service is having on residents in Coventry."

# **Conservation Area status** for city neighbourhoods



**Coventry City Council** has approved plans to designate Earlsdon and **Brownshill Green as Conservation Areas.** 

A Conservation Area can be summarised as, 'an area of special architectural or historic interest, the character of which it is desirable to preserve or enhance'. It means the area's unique character, appearance and history are protected, and the local planning authority has additional controls on development proposals.

Both areas were proposed as Conservation Areas in Coventry's 2017 Local Plan, with Earlsdon being considered to be one of the best surviving examples of a Victorian and Edwardian period suburb in the city, and Brownshill Green as having an agricultural heritage and settlement pattern that offers a unique contribution to Coventry. # New play area to open at Coombe Abbey Park



Coventry City Council has invested in a new attraction, called Hermit's Hollow, in Coombe Abbey Park. Close to the hugely successful Go Ape, the play area will offer a brand new fun and engaging area for kids to play in, which will be based on a period of Coombe's history.

The new play area will be managed by No Ordinary Hospitality Management (NOHM), which operates Coombe Abbey Hotel and The Avenue at Coombe.

The theme of the new play facility is based on a notable period of Coombe's nearly 900year history when it was the

residence of Princess Elizabeth. daughter of King James I in the early 1600s.

During her time there, the princess was gifted an 'island' within the grounds where she ordered the creation of a cottage for a widow and her children, where fowls would be kept, and it was given the appearance of

a type of building known as a hermitage.

It is hoped that Hermit's Hollow will help to stir the imagination of children, as well as offering plenty of ways to slide, climb and run around!

It is being created by the team at Creating Adventurous Places (CAP.Co) and is inspired by the

natural setting, particularly Smite Brook, which sits adjacent to the play site.

The new play area is part of a wider investment of £650,000 by Coventry City Council into attractions at Coombe.

Cllr Abdul Salam Khan, **Deputy Leader of Coventry** City Council, said:

"Coombe Abbey Park is a fantastic outdoor venue and we are delighted to be investing in another attraction at Coombe Abbey.

"We have worked extremely hard with a range of partners to create Hermit's Hollow and it means there is even more to see and do for visitors to Coombe."

Tickets for the new attraction will be £3.95 and are available to be booked online or at The Avenue. The new facility will complement the newly refurbished play area at the Visitor Centre, and the Climbing Forest which will remain open and free to play in.



# **Council Tax** support

**Residents on a low** income are being advised that they can get help towards their **Council Tax payments.** 

Coventry City Council wants to ensure that people are aware that there is support available if households on a low income are struggling to make council tax payments.

Council Tax Support, is a scheme where working age households can receive a reduction of up to 85 per cent.

The scheme can also provide up to 100 per cent of the cost of council tax for pension age households. People who are claiming Universal Credit or other benefits won't automatically receive council tax support, but they can make a claim to ensure they don't pay more than they need to. **Cllr Jaswant Singh Birdi** is the new Lord Mayor of the City of Coventry after being presented with the Chains of Office at **Coventry Cathedral.** 



Cllr Mal Mutton was named as the Deputy Lord Mayor for the coming year.

Cllr Birdi has spent 17 years as a councillor in the city, representing Bablake Ward for the past nine years.

Cllr Birdi was born in a village in the Panjab in the north of India. In the mid-1950s he emigrated with his parents to Kenya in East Africa, and emigrated to the UK in the '60s.

He becomes the first Lord Mayor of Coventry to wear a turban. He said:

"I am so proud to become Lord Mayor of my adopted home city. As a Sikh, and wearing



# 700 species found in City Nature Challenge

Dozens of people took part in the recent City Nature Challenge which set out to record as much nature as possible in Coventry.



Using a smart phone app called iNaturalist, nature recorders took photos or recordings of plants and animals to help contribute to the records of biodiversity in the city. Over 700 different species were found in Coventry, with 2,650 individual observations made by nearly 80 participants.

The recordings collected will help shape plans by partners for improving the biodiversity of the city in the future.
