



British Science Week sees a Wave of Activity for Pupils

To celebrate British Science Week, pupils from HES visited the National Sea Life Centre - Birmingham. This was the perfect opportunity to enrich our learning of Biology. We were able to explore habitats, food chains, adaptation, communities, competition, biodiversity and conservation all whilst observing the animals.

When we arrived at the Sea Life Centre we were invited to touch a living starfish. Some of our pupils were brave enough to feel the rough, hard starfish and one pupil described this a highlight of the trip.

We walked through the UK's only 360° tunnel where we marvelled at sharks, giant turtles and rays. We watched the UK's first sea otters – Ozzy and Ola at feeding time and observed penguins in their icy habitat. It was fascinating to see these creatures close up and we could observe and describe how these animals having adapted to survive in their environment.

A fantastic time was had by all and pupils described it as a really positive experience despite having to do a little bit of work! According to our pupils the highlights of the day were: the sharks, nemo, starfish, jelly fish and a special meet and greet from Peppa pig.

As a service, we highlight the importance of Online Safety throughout the academic year and shine a spotlight on Internet Safety Day to raise awareness of staying safe online. We had a range of activities going on across the week that included an online quiz, a new online safety website and the tutorial programme which was devoted to this important topic.

This year we launched our Online Safety Pupil Site which has tailored information for our pupils to access on how to stay safe online. Research from the UK Safer Internet Centre reports that 69% of 8 to 17 years olds think online safety lessons help them know who to talk to at school with online issues and questions. We want to make sure all pupils have access to support when they need it and verified information and guidance to support their understanding of the online world.

Police Museum Visit is a Blueprint for Success

On the 31st January a group of Year 9 and 10 Inspire History students visited the Birmingham Police Museum with Mrs Sykes and Mr Green. The Museum is located in central Birmingham right next to the Children's Hospital. The Museum was built in the 1891 in the Victorian Period and was in fact an actual working prison which housed inmates right up until 2016!

During the visit we were able to see and handle real policing artefacts from policing in WW2 including helmets, rationing books, original police orders and gas masks.



We took part in a criminal investigation task where we had to examine clues including finger prints, handwriting, shoe markings and DNA. We then had to decide who we thought the perpetrator of the crime was based on the evidence we collected.



We had a tour of the museum, where we got to sit in both Victorian cells and modern day cells. At one point the lights were turned off and we sat in the pitch black so that we could experience the darkness of a real Victorian cell! They also had 'smell' boxes where you could smell what it would have been like in a cell- this really wasn't very pleasant!

We looked at some of the old punishment methods such as 'birching' and also saw original mugshot documentation of Victorian Prisoners!



Spotlight on Wellbeing -∽Ò́-

As many students are preparing for tests and exams in the summer term, media reports focus on the stress and anxiety that some students can feel at this time. For some, the effects of stress can be minor or even positive but research suggests that one in seven students can feel highly anxious about tests. Here at Whitmore Park Annexe we have been working hard to tackle the concerns and worries our students will be experiencing in the run up to their GCSEs.

Tackling this common issue forms a critical element of our wellbeing curriculum, particularly as many of our students have a shared tendency towards heightened anxiety at key assessment points. This term, students have been invited to take part in a series of sessions to help them understand some important facts about exam stress and anxiety, whilst sharing some simple ways that it can be effectively managed.

The STEPS programme (Strategies to Tackle Exam Pressure and Stress) has been developed by Professor David Putwain at Liverpool John Moore's University and successfully delivered in a variety of mainstream and alternative education settings, such as ours. This term, students in our Aspire classroom have discussed what it feels like to experience exam anxiety and how we can recognise the signs. We have also delved into the ways we can challenge negative thinking by using positive self-talk whilst exploring some useful strategies to help us feel calmer in particularly stressful situations.

The strategies covered so far seem to have had a positive impact during the most recent 'exam practice' fortnight. Students were able to recognise those familiar negative thoughts and have been really stepping up (no pun intended!) to the challenge with some fabulous successes! There has been a wonderfully supportive atmosphere amongst those students who are able to attend our weekly sessions – I want to congratulate them being open to try things outside of their comfort zone.

When we return after the Easter break, supporting students during revision season will be one of our key priorities. During our remaining STEPS sessions, we will be investigating some of the best ways to plan and approach revision, talking about how to get motivated and the benefits of visualisation, with the hope they will understand what strategies work best for them.

Working towards exams can create lots of feelings of worry and being under pressure, however we hope with these sessions, pupils will feel they are more prepared to successfully tackle their summer exams.
