You will have read in the news that school absence is at a record high following the pandemic.

At the Hospital Education Service, we recognise more than most, the impact that poor health can have on attendance.

I want to thank all of our parents and carers for your support in working with us to improve your child's attendance by reducing barriers and sharing the positive messaging around the importance of regular attendance on achieving positive outcomes.

Our percentage of persistent absence has reduced from 69% last year to 39% this term alone as a result of your support.


BLETCHLEY PARK VISIT OFFERS PUPILS A CRACKING INSIGHT

On Thursday 30th November, 11 students visited Bletchley Park, home to the codebreakers of World War II.

Our day started with a workshop on modern-day cyber security, exploring six top tips for personal cyber security. This included how to create a strong passphrase, exploring the technology behind biometrics and considering what information to share in our social media feeds.

After lunch we had time to explore the site, starting with the mansion, one of the coding huts and museum exhibitions sharing further information about the Enigma machine and the Bombe machine. We also watched a short film that explained how the work completed by the employees of Bletchley Park contributed to the D-Day mission. Our visit ended with a guided tour, where we learned more about the journey of a message from the receiving stations on the coast, transported by motorcycle to Bletchley Park, decoded by the people working in the huts and pieced together for the commander to act upon. Our tour's final stops included the office where Alan Turing worked and a memorial with the phrase 'We Also Served', recognising the contribution that the employees of Bletchley Park could not share for many years after the war due to the level of secrecy to which they were held; (remarkably, the actions carried on site were classed as above 'Top Secret' and were categorised 'Ultra Secret'!)

This is our service's third trip to Bletchley Park and we had another wonderful day out. We look forward to visiting again and continuing our exploration of the site as yet again we ran out of time to see everything.










CAN YOU CRACK THE CODE?
