## Children Demographics May 2025

#### **Population**

The population of Coventry is growing. The 2021 Office for National Statistics' (ONS) mid-year population estimates give a figure of 344,151 for the total population of Coventry. The population has grown by 8.6% since the 2011 mid-year estimates (316,915). This rate of growth was higher than the region (6.2%) and England as a whole (6.5%).

The increase in population is due to natural change (more births than deaths) and international migration. The fact that internation migration has contributed to the population growth of Coventry in recent years.

The split between males (171,554) and females (172,597) is relatively even. The median age of the population has increased by one year since 2011 Census to 35 in Census 2021, which is 5 years lower than the England and regional average of 40 years. Based on population size measured by the Census 2021, Coventry is the ninth largest city in England and twelfth largest in the United Kingdom.

Here we use the 2021 mid-year population estimates, based closely on the 2021 Census data, as they give the most reliable understanding of Coventry's population size and its growth, despite being a few years old. While the population will very likely have grown to some extent since 2021, it is known that the most recent population estimates for mid-2023 exaggerate the extent of recent growth in Coventry.

Estimating the growth and projecting the future population of Coventry is fraught with difficulty<sup>1</sup>. According to the ONS 2023 mid-year estimates, the usual resident population of Coventry in 2023 was estimated to have grown to 360,702 persons, but we consider this to be an overestimate. To try and estimate the extent of population growth in recent years, we can use the growth seen between 2011 and 2021, as measured by censuses, as the best estimate of current annual growth rates; an average of 0.9% per year or approximately 3,000 additional residents per year.

## Population of children

According to ONS population estimates 2021, just over one-fifth (22.2%) of the city's population are children and young people aged under 18, 63.1% are aged 18-64, and the remaining 14.7% are aged 65 and over. The table below shows these population estimates for Coventry and illustrates that a slightly higher proportion of Coventry's population is made up of children and young people aged under 18 compared to the regional and national averages.

The table below shows the population of children broken down into age groups, and how the population size of each age group changed between 2011 and 2021. Overall, the number of child residents of Coventry increased, although the growth rates varied by age groups, with a notable increase in the number of children aged 5-14 but a fall in the number of infants aged 0-4, influenced by falling birth rates over this period.

Like with the total population of Coventry of all ages, in a similar way as described above while we can say that the population of children has continued to grow in recent years (since 2021)<sup>2</sup> it is difficult to accurately know the extent of recent growth and forecast future growth in the child population. To try and estimate the extent of population growth amongst children aged 0-14 in recent years, and attempt a forecast of how it will grow in the next few years, we can use the growth seen between 2011 and 2021, as measured by censuses, as the best estimate of current annual growth rates; an average of 0.9% per year or approximately 550 additional child residents aged 0-14 per year.

#### Child population by ward

According to the Census 2021, there was an estimated 64,504 children aged 0-14 years living in Coventry in 2021, making up 18.7% of the total population of the city. The table below shows how this population is distributed by ward, highlighting the wards with the highest population of children, and showing the proportion of the total population of each ward that is aged 0-14.

More than a quarter of Foleshill's population are children aged under 15 (5,740, 25.5% of total in this age range) whereas Wainbody has the lowest child population with only one-eighth of


the population being children aged 0 to 14 years (1,877, 12.3% of total in this age range). Lower Stoke, Henley, Holbrook, Longford, and Radford also have relatively high numbers of 0 to 14 year old children (each ward with an estimate of more than 4,000 children). So, the North-East of Coventry generally has a relatively high population density of children aged 0-14.

#### Birth Rate

The chart below shows that birth rates had been on a falling trend since 2011 but plateaued over recent years. The total number of births to mothers living in Coventry was 4,036 in 2023 down from a peak of 4,801 in 2011. The fertility rate in Coventry, the number of births as a rate of the population of Coventry women aged 15-44, has been falling. Whilst the reducing rate is partly due to changing demographics, for example increasing number of full-time students in Coventry, this trend is not unique to Coventry; total births and the fertility rates have also been falling across England overall and West Midlands region. While the total number of births per year to Coventry mothers has been flat in recent years, without a clear up or down annual trend, this is slightly different to the regional and national picture where births have continued to gradually decrease overall, with some fluctuations.

The Total Fertility Rate (TFR) in Coventry in 2023 was down to 1.48, from 1.92 in 2014; similar to the rates across the region and country overall, 1.58 for the West Midlands region and 1.44 for England overall. The fertility rate statistic in Coventry is lower than it otherwise would be due to a relatively high population of full-time students living here; so the fact that rates are similar to the national average suggests that birth rates amongst non-student populations in the city are slightly higher than the national average.



It is difficult to project whether the number of births in Coventry is likely to decrease or increase in the coming years. In Coventry the number of births appears to be plateauing in recent years, after a reducing trend up to 2021.

The number of births by Coventry ward of residence of the mother is presented in the table below. It shows noticeable variations between areas of Coventry in annual births. Foleshill has the highest number of births of all Coventry's 18 wards, St Micheal's has the second highest number. The number of births had been falling as a trend in most wards, however between 2013 and 2023 Bablake and Henley ward trends differ, seeing an overall small increase in the number of births. Looking at more recent trends, we can see a notable increase in births between 2022 and 2023 in St. Michael's.

# **Ethnicity**

Coventry is a diverse city with a population from diverse ethnic backgrounds. The most recent population data we have is from the Census 2021<sup>3</sup>. It shows 44.7% of Coventry's total population is made up of residents from ethnic minority groups, that is from an ethnic group other than 'White British.' This increased from 33.4% in 2011, so Coventry's population has become more ethnically diverse and is more diverse than average for England; nationally 26.5% of the population are from ethnic minority groups.

The table below shows that the child population (aged 0-15) of Coventry by ethnic group, comparing data from the Census 2011 and the Census 2021. It illustrates that the child population became more diverse in those 10 years, the proportion being from ethnic minority groups<sup>4</sup> increasing from 39.9% to 53.5%.

The annual school census data<sup>5</sup> survey records information about all school children, gives further evidence on the ethnic diversity of Coventry's child population. This data is more up to date, with the most recent data being from January 2024. It covers all school children, so generally gives a picture of Coventry children aged 4-17 years.

The school census data shows that the school-aged population of Coventry has been showing an increasing level of diversity over the last 12 years. The table on the next page shows the total number of pupils in state-funded primary, secondary and special schools in Coventry and how they are broken down by ethnic background.

In January 2024, 58.6% of pupils were from an ethnic minority background (not White British), up from 39.3% in 2012 previously.

Coventry's child population is more ethnically diverse than the adult population overall and is becoming more diverse over time, this indicates that the total population is very likely to become more diverse in the future, with an increasing proportion of the city's population being from an ethnic minority background.

This table shows the number of households by category in Coventry, divided according to the type of composition of household members; it shows counts of households that include children. It shows that the number of households of almost all types increased in number between 2011 and 2021. The biggest increase was amongst households composed of a couple and dependent children, increasing in number by 2,589 additional households over the 10 years between the censuses. On the other hand, the total number of lone parent households with dependent children decreased by 1,295; while the number of other types of households with dependent children (not a single couple, nor including lone parents), increased, up by 782.

# Deprivation

There are pockets of deprivation across Coventry that limit people's opportunities to succeed in life. Transforming life chances require addressing the social inequalities that are established right from the earliest years.

Depending on the way it is measured, Coventry ranks between 64th and 81st as one of the most deprived local authority areas of 317 in England. Therefore, the city ranks amongst the most deprived quarter of places in England overall. Coventry continues to have relatively high deprivation with large areas of very high and enduring deprivation. Coventry also ranks particularly poorly in terms of the Income Deprivation Affecting Children Index (IDACI).

The Indices of Deprivation data gives the richest picture of deprivation, allowing us to look at local neighbourhood's and how they compare to others in the country. However, low-income statistics give a more targeted and timelier picture of low-income affecting children. The government's 'Children in low-income families: local area statistics' provide estimates of the number of children in households with a relatively low income (less than 60% of the national median household income level, calculated before housing costs are considered).

The most recent estimates for financial year 2022/23 are 19,571 children aged 0-15 years living in Coventry in low-income families – making up more than a quarter of all Coventry children, 27.7%. This compares to 28.4% throughout the West Midlands and 19.8% in England. This has been on an increasing trend in Coventry, and elsewhere, since 2014/15. The impact of the cost-of-living crisis may mean these rates increase further in Coventry and across the country.

The extent of 'child poverty' can be measured in other ways<sup>9</sup>, the End Child Poverty campaign attempts to model the number of children who live in households with a relatively low income (less than 60% of the national median household income), calculating income after the costs of housing are taken away. Rates are higher when calculated this way. For 2022/23 they estimate that 34,344 of Coventry children (0-15) live in poverty, which amounts to over one third of all children living in Coventry, 42.2%.

#### Free School Meals

Not all children living in low-income households receive free school meals. In the autumn term of 2023/24, there were a total of 16,575 pupils in Coventry schools eligible for free school meals, making up 26.9% of all pupils compared to 24.6% across England overall. The number of pupils eligible for free school meals has been increasing year on year.
